# Building Permits Plunge during First Quarter

- Permits were filed for just 151 new residential units in Manhattan during the first quarter, 69% less than a year ago. During February, not a single permit was filed in Manhattan.
- In Brooklyn, the decline was more severe, as units covered under permits fell 91% to 137.
- A combination of the current economic climate, combined with inflated numbers a year ago due to tax law and building code changes, has led to steep declines in permits over the past year.

## Conforming Mortgages Still Near Historic Lows

- For the week ending May 7th, the average 30-year conforming mortgage rate was 4.84%. This was up slightly from 4.78% the week before.
- A year ago, 30-year conforming rates were averaging 6.05%.

### NYC Unemployment Falls in March

- After a sharp rise in February, unemployment in New York City fell to 8.2% in March.
- One year ago, this figure was at 4.6%, an unusually low rate for the City. Over the past 30 years, the annual unemployment rate has averaged 7.7% in NYC.


### 86,400 Jobs Lost in NYC over Past Year


- For the 12 months ending in March, employment in New York City fell by 86,400 jobs, or 2.3%.
- This was less than the 3.5% rate of decline for the nation over this time
- The health care and education sectors remained strong in NYC over the past year, adding 14,600 jobs.
