# NYC Job Growth Slows

- Employment in New York City rose by 48,300 from February 2012 to February 2013, a 1.3% gain.
- Professional and business services (+27,100) and education and health services (+17,800) added the most jobs over the past year.
- Job cuts were led by financial activities (-5,700), 4,700 of which were in the securities sector.

# Mortgage Rates Fall for Second Straight Week
